Speaker Topic:	Quality Control Measures used in Policing and Risk Management		
Speaker bio:	Paul Cross retired from the El Paso Police Department in 2007 after 24 years of service, serving the last four years as the Assistant Chief in charge of the Office of Operations. At that time, the Office of Operations encompassed all of the Regional Commands in the city as well as the Major Crimes Bureau. Chief Cross supervised three Deputy Chiefs and seven Commanders. Major Crimes included all Criminal and Directed Investigations to include Crimes Against Persons, Narcotics, Sex Assault Offenses, Financial Crimes, Crimes Against Children, and all detectives' investigations.		
	He has supervised over 80 homicide investigations and hundreds of Sexual Assault and Robbery investigations in his capacity as the Chief in charge of the Office of Operations. Chief Cross has a tremendous amount of knowledge in criminal investigations and evidence collection. He served as the Department's Emergency Management Coordinator for the Emergency Operations Center for four years. He has extensive knowledge in Counter-Terrorism, Emergency Management, Critical Infrastructure Protection, and Weapons of Mass Destruction.		

Chief Cross is a graduate of Central State University in Ohio, where he earned a Bachelor of Arts in Communications, in 1982. He is also a graduate of the prestigious F.B.I. National Academy, consisting of Police Executives from all over the world. He served as President of the 1,500 member Texas Chapter of this prestigious organization in 2014. He has a Master of Business Administration from the University of Phoenix. He has 28 years of supervisory experience of which 24 years were in middle and upper management positions within the EI Paso Police Department and Sheriff's Office. Chief Cross was awarded the Executive of the Year Award for the EI Paso Police Department in 2006, and was awarded the "Adelante Con Ganas Award" from State Senator Eliot Shapleigh in 2005.

Chief Cross has 14 years of college teaching experience and is a part time instructor at the University of Texas at El Paso. He has taught Counter-Terrorism, Homeland Security and Critical Infrastructure Protection at the graduate and undergraduate level at UTEP, Webster University and the University of Phoenix. Chief Cross has always been involved in the community. He is a Life Member of Kappa Alpha Psi Fraternity. He has served as Polemarch and on the Board of Directors for the El Paso-Las Cruces Chapter and has been active in the Chapter for 32 years. He has served on the Board of Directors for the El Paso Chapter of the Fellowship of Christian Athletes, and has served as the President of the Board of Directors for Family Services of El Paso.

Chief Cross continues his distinguished law enforcement career and in January 2009 was appointed as a Commander with the El Paso County Sheriff's Department. He commanded the Criminal Investigations Bureau, which includes Homicide, Crimes Against Persons, Crimes Against Property, Narcotics, Warrants, Crime Scene Investigation, Civil Process, and Identification and Records.

In September of 2015, Chief Cross was promoted and assigned to head the Jail Annex of the El Paso County Sheriff's office where he is currently assigned as the Jail Annex Chief.

KIM PRIES

We have been "reforming" public education for something like 120 years. Putative problems continue to be part of the public school "persona." Why would we see problems for such a long time? Could it have something to do with the quasi-religious tools used in education?

- Bloom's cognitive taxonomy (not based on research)
- Krathwohl's affective taxonomy (not based on research)
- Three different psychomotor taxonomies, also with little to no basis in research

The education situation reminds me of the Failure Modes and Effect Analysis (FMEA) tool. I have searched for the better part of 30 years to find some real research on this instrument, but I have yet to see anything peer-reviewed and meaningful. Yet, we continue to see the FMEA called a "good" tool in *Quality Progress* and other documents. Nobody, as far as I can tell, has ever proven it is a good tool.

Another statement in the same class is "best practices." A best practice is not a best practice unless we prove it is a best practice. If what I have seen as "best practices" seems to work, we are probably guilty of confirmation bias, not to mention, fundamental attribution error.

Can we bring an end to what I call "lore." Most of us laugh at astrology and then turn around and practice pseudo-science. Meh.




SPC for short runs.

We have short production runs, and there is SPC for these. There are some sites like Data Net Quality Systems¹ and I Six Sigma² with good advice on how to implement it.

One aspect of applying a standardized chart is the selection of the estimate of the standard deviation: after collecting some data, I first used the standard deviation of the run and the result was a chart with many out of control points. (we used 3 products with targets: 280, 370, 412mm)



Fortunately, I later used the standard deviation of each product and I obtained a more reasonable chart.



There are other two methods to estimate the standard deviation.
